Anaesthetic on-call commitment/ details:	On-calls at RMH Sutton site [There is no emergency/obstetric department at RMH]
	Anaesthetic bleep-holders provide senior resident cover for acute management of adults and children undergoing chemo/radiotherapy, bone marrow transplant and stem cell therapy. Most common issues are sepsis, bleeding and seizures. Emergency surgery is uncommon.
	The role of the anaesthetic bleep-holder is prompt assessment of sick patients, supporting outreach and junior medical staff, and stabilisation and preparation for transfer if patients require critical care. There is the facility for level 2 and 3 care at RMH Sutton but this is only used as a bridge to transfer to a definitive HDU/ITU (usually RMH Chelsea).
	Whilst unpredictable, out-of-hours calls are infrequent and many fellows on this rota choose to consolidate their on-call commitment in 24-hour shifts. Advanced Pain Trainees are exempt from day-time on-call commitments but previous APTs have opted for a similar on-call pattern for weekend work and to seek training opportunities either side of week- day night on-calls as they have found that this arrangement maximises their training time and is manageable and safe.
	We recognise that this is unusual compared to on-call arrangements at most other trusts. It is important to note that we are very flexible and are committed to accommodating personal preferences and circumstances as far as is possible. 	Westminster. Previous trainees have sometimes sought additional procedural opportunities at other trusts, according to convenience and individual needs, and we are happy to support and facilitate this. supported and facilitated.
	RMH offers a rich outpatient clinic experience which provides trainees with the skills to assess and manage a wide range of pain conditions. In addition to cancer pain, patients commonly present with musculoskeletal pain, persistent post-
	surgical pain and a range of neuropathic pain conditions associated with cancer treatment.
Access to MDTs:	There is a weekly joint pain and palliative care team MDT with input from physiotherapists, psychologists, pharmacists and service managers.
