Placement details	A&E – Emergency Medicine
Department	For the A&E job you will work within the A&E team
	as a whole, but also with many other working groups. There are 7 A&E Consultants, at least one of which is always around, there are around 30 middle grades with usually 4 working at a time (but will changeover throughout the day) and 14 SHOs (usually 3-5 working at any time). There are about 80 nurses of different levels in total and usually around 12 are working at a time. In the Observation Bay itself there will be the FY1, a Nurse and an A&E technician (extremely well trained HCAs); however the rest of the A&E team is never far away to offer help when it's needed. The Observation Bay has 6 beds and 4 chairs for patients and is regularly full, most of these patients will be your responsibility, but sometimes the A&E doctor who initially clerked them will continue their management. On top of this venturing out into the Majors areas to see new patients is essential for gaining the surgical competencies that the post is designed for. The job also requires working extensively with other teams of specialists; in particular the ICRT team. Their remit is to prevent unnecessary admissions so this will help facilitate the discharge of many Observation Bay patients.

Main duties of the placement	The main job is looking after patients in the Observation ward. Entails assessing them for suitability for discharge, deterioration or other changes in condition. Plenty of multidisciplinary team discharge co-ordination. When the Observation Bay is quieter there is lots of opportunity to see patients in the Minors area (good for surgical skills such as suturing and fracture management) Majors area (good for seeing surgical abdomens especially) and the Resuscitation Room (great for everything acute).

Type of work to expect and learning opportunities	The ambulatory emergency care unit (AEC) is a new and exciting facility which is currently evolving and expanding. The AEC helps to reduce the work load from the accident and emergency department and the acute medical take, though essentially it is a community facing service and works in a tight interface with general practice. A broad range of medical conditions are evaluated on the unit daily, many of them involving more peripheral specialties such as rheumatology and dermatology. There are also weekly hot clinics in rheumatology, endocrinology, gastroenterology and cardiology
	Each FY1 will be paired with a dedicated FY2 and they rotate through an 8 week rota of working on the ward, covering the post take with the on call consultant, clerking new admissions, helping to cover the enhanced care area with the MET registrar or working in AEC. All areas are fully supported with daily consultant cover and there are three registrars, one of whom will cover the trolley bay and will help with post take jobs. The Enhanced Care Area is covered by a dedicated registrar or senior clinical fellow and is a good

Department	The Care of the Elderly department has various teams based on the sub-specialty interest including Acute Geriatrics, Frailty, Stroke, Heart Failure and Orthogeriatrics. For inpatient care, our department covers 5 bed bases as mentioned below:
	Crane Ward is a 28 bed (12 male, 12 female and 4 side rooms) Acute Care of the Elderly ward. This ward has acutely ill patients who have complex multimorbidities requiring MDT approach. Consultants are Dr Tsam and second consultant (awaiting substantive consultant).
	Kew ward - 22 Stroke beds and 6 Care of the Elderly bed. As Stroke is a condition more commonly affecting Older People, hence most of the stroke patients will also be requiring same MDT comprehensive approach. 2 consultants- Dr R Singh and Dr A Ali-Sheikh
	Lampton Ward- 18 beds are under Dr Chapman and 11 beds are under cardiology consultant. Dr Chapman has sub-specialist interest in Heart failure. Consultants- Dr Chapman, Dr Patel
	Other Care of the Elderly bed base: Marble Hill 1-Acute Frailty Unit- 14 bedded unit under Dr Martin-Marero. Syon 2 ward-10-18 bedded Orthogeriatrics unit.

medical on calls. West Middlesex is a busy hospital and offers trainees vast work experience of various medical conditions. The on calls are well supported by acute medical team.

Ward work:

As an FY1 Doctor, you will generally be on the ward during the 'normal' working day and expected to deliver the daily medical care of all the patients on their ward irrespective of specialty.

Consultant- twice a week consultant led ward rounds. The registrar does a ward round on 1-2 days per week.

As an FY2, you will be expected to do a ward round with at least one other FY1.

This is an excellent opportunity to see a large range of acute pathology and manage patients, taking responsibility for the sick patients and doing ward rounds; but generally the workload is shared quite equally. You will have opportunity to learn to coordinate and prioritise tasks.

There is opportunity for procedures on the ward occasionally including chest drains and lumbar punctures, but these tend to be a rarity.

The consultants will encourage the trainee doctors to do some essential curricular work including audits and revision for various exams.

You will be expected to attend weekly MDT meetings (1.5 hours per week), X-ray meetings (1 hour per week) and journal clubs (1 hour per week). These meetings are educational and would help in developing greater understanding of managing patients with complex multiple comorbidities that are acutely unwell.

FY1 Teaching on Thursday 1400-1500. It is essential to attend 70% of the teaching.

On Fridays, you will be expected to attend a handover session to the weekend day on-call team with a list of patients, highlighting the patients who would reviews.

Communication being very essential, you will be expected to talk to patients families (visiting starts at 14:00), and to document the conversations held very clearly in the notes

Imperial hosts a diverse expertise in specialist anaesthetic areas including neonatology and paediatrics, simulation, burns, neuropathic pain, intensive care, neurocognitive diseases, perioperative care, and long term quality of life, innovation and technology, big data and the use of robotic engineering in acute hospitals. The main objective of this programme is to help trainees to identify their areas of research interest and support them during their development. Dr Seth Galton is the lead for the programme and first point of contact for all trainees.
	We highly recommend junior doctors to obtain the Good Clinical Practice (GCP) certificate, attend an introduction to Research Course run by the NIHR before they start their academic block. We encourage them to attend the six week statistical course, which is run in the Magill Department of Anaesthesia, Intensive Care and Pain Management twice a year. A list of research themes and academic project supervisors is listed below but this list is not exhaustive. We are flexible and we support trainees' areas of interest. Trainees are encouraged to explore and expand their horizons. Respiratory & Critical Care led by Professor Masao
	Takata (http://www.imperial.ac.uk/people/m.takata). Professor Takata has established an internationally recognised unique translational research programme in the field of respiratory and critical care medicine at Imperial College. Specific interests include the tumour necrosis factor signalling, novel roles of monocytes and their subsets, and the development of new anti-inflammatory therapies in these disease models. Recent focus of the group is placed particularly on clinical translational studies investigating the innate immune system functions in

perioperative, critical care, trauma and burns patients.

Perioperative Research into Memory is led by Dr Marcela Vizcaychipi

(http://www.imperial.ac.uk/people/m.vizcaychipi). The group conducts clinical translational research and the key areas of research are neurocognitive function in anaesthesia & intensive Care, long-term psychological impact of medical admission to acute hospitals, technology and innovation on health behavior and identification of preventative cellular mechanisms of memory decline. The group collaborates with robotic engineering, cybernetic engineering, neuroscientists, the Royal College of Art and computational engineering. An example of current work can be seen in this link https://www.icarewean.org. Trainees are encouraged to take part in systematic reviews following the Cochrane approach. The main areas for review are dementia and cognitive function in acute medicine, autonomic nervous system and technology in the perioperative care.

Neuropathic Pain Research is led by Professor Andrew Rice

(www.imperial.ac.uk/people/a.rice). The group conducts translational research in neuropathic pain particularly in the context of infectious diseases (HIV, herpes zoster and leprosy), diabetes and nerve trauma. Activities range from animal models, through deep profiling of patients to clinical trials and evidence synthesis using systematic review and meta-analysis. Within the CAMARADES and EQIPD consortia

(www.eqipd.orgwww.dcn.ed.ac.uk/camarades/default.htm) we are pioneering meta-analytical approaches for integrating pre-clinical evidence, including the development of technologies such as text mining and machine learning. The clinical programme of deep profiling patients with painful neuropathies is elucidating clinical heterogeneity, biomarkers and risk factors, including genetic, across a range of painful neuropathies with a focus on HIV neuropathy, carpal tunnel syndrome, leprosy, diabetic neuropathy and non-freezing cold injury. This is mainly being delivered through large EU-funded collaborations

(www.imieuropain.orgwww.upf.edu/web/neuropain www.dolorisk.eu/). Our group consists of junior doctors from a range of specialities, allied health care professionals and basic scientists.

Sepsis Research is led by Professor Anthony Gordon (http://www.imperial.ac.uk/people/anthony.gordon) Our group conducts translational research in sepsis and includes the whole spectrum of research from early laboratory work through to large-scale national and international clinical trials (eg VANISH and LeoPARDStrials). The overall goal is to develop our novel

	basic science discoveries, into effective diagnostic and treatment strategies that change and improve clinical care of critically ill patients. In particular we are developing "Personalised Medicine in Sepsis" through an NIHR Research Professorship award, using genominc, transcriptomic and metabolic profiling combined with point-of-care diagnostic testing.
