Main duties of the placement	<p>During this placement, Foundation Year 1 doctors will get an extensive experience of acute medicine and general medicine conditions. The Acute Medical Unit in Hillingdon Hospital is a busy department, with a high turnover of patients that present with a range of medical conditions. Patients are expected to remain on the unit, between 24-72 hours. Patients may be discharged home following this period or be moved to a long stay medical ward. The FY1 doctor plays a vital role within the acute medicine team.</p> <p>Typical duties include, accompanying the AMU consultant on the ward round and documenting on the electronic notes (Cerner.) The afternoon duties would include requesting investigations, completing discharge summaries, carrying out procedures such as venepuncture, cannulation and arterial blood gases. In addition, FY1 doctors may have the opportunity to undertake procedures such as lumbar punctures and ascitic drains.</p> <p>There will be an opportunity to teach medical students and physician associate students. As well as present in the AMU board round and weekly AMU teaching.</p> <p>FY1 doctors will also be part of the medical oncall rota. This would include early post-take shifts, clerking shifts, and night ward cover.</p>

Here you will learn how to assess a patient for surgery (Preassessment), basics of delivering a simple general anaesthetic. Skills include intravascular access, simple airway manoeuvres, basics regional anaesthetic (Spinal and USS use).</p> <p>Shadowing on call anaesthetists in office hours. Aiming to deliver a simple anaesthetic whilst supervised ITU, consists of being part of the ITU team managing the ITU unit during weekdays. This includes daily ward rounds with the consultant, MDT meetings and Microbiology ward round. Here you learn the concepts of ITU, medications used, intravascular skills, assessment of a critically ill patient. Shadowing the doctors who receive the referrals.</p>

Main duties of the placement	<p>Trainees will begin their placement with a full two day local induction programme and orientation to the Department. This includes, among other things, child protection training (to level two) and resuscitation training. We are sometimes able to secure an ALS course place for our F1 doctors.</p> <p>Trainees will spend their mornings supporting the ED consultants' ward rounds on the Department's Observation Ward. This is a twelve bedded, high turnover, short stay unit, primarily reserved for ED patients. Trainees will take an active role in reviewing patients' responses to acute treatment, as well as making discharge decisions under the guidance of a consultant. They will gain a thorough grounding in essential ward based clinical and administrative duties that will be invaluable to future work in other specialities.</p> <p>Trainees will spend their afternoons in the main department, and will be actively involved in the acute assessment, investigation, initial management and disposal of the full spectrum of Emergency Department presentations, including acute medicine, surgery, orthopaedics, paediatrics, psychiatry, obstetrics and gynaecology, as well as minor injuries and illness. Trainees are well supported with a consultant 'shop floor' throughout their shifts.</p>

	<p>Our department attaches great importance to the education, training and development of its trainees. We therefore provide one whole day of protected teaching per month, at which attendance is mandatory (unless trainees are on annual leave). These sessions are consultant led, and cover topics relevant to Emergency Medicine practice, as well as to allied specialties, that trainees may ultimately pursue.</p>

Main duties of the placement	<p>We are a busy surgical unit that performs approximately 200 elective and emergency surgical procedures a month.</p> <p>Apart from the general skills of organisation and efficiency that this job demands and cultivates, it is particularly good for learning very quickly how to manage acute surgical admissions as well as experience of the management of the deteriorating surgical patient. There are plenty of opportunities to perform practical procedures on the wards, assist in theatre as well as attend outpatient clinics, all of which are integral to personal and professional development. There is a lot of interaction with the consultants, not just on ward rounds but also in forums such as the weekly radiology meeting, the MDT meeting and on the regular teaching ward rounds. The ward rounds will be led by either a consultant or one of the juniors.</p> <p>F1s are expected to review patients, review investigations and formulate a management plan (with senior support) and document on CERNER (electronic patient record).
